Adolescence is a critical period in the life-course and presents many opportunities for intervention to enhance health then and for later adulthood. East Africa has a considerable adolescent population bulge with the challenge of the "demographic dividend" to be achieved. AKU, ICRH, Coastal Counties Governments and partners agreed to hold a two-day International Symposium in Kwale County, Kenya, on Adolescent and Youth Health and Wellbeing.

Expected outcomes include partnership resolutions to strengthen the Jumuiya Health Sector Working to include a multi-sectorial adolescent and youth health and wellbeing policy and strategy development. The collaborative platform (JKP Changing the Story Partnership Network) would include County government agencies, higher education institutions, youth organizations, the Aga Khan Development Network, civil society stakeholders and development agencies, as well as the Network of UNESCO Chairs in Kenya in order to provide evidence-based strategies, practices, and policies. In addition, commitments from governments as well as development partners and stakeholders, needed to implement the policies and strategies, will be discussed.

An estimated one third of girls and one fifth of boys in Kenya have experienced sexual and gender based violence by the time they turn 18 years. Sexual and gender based violence may leave serious, life-long negative, physical, sexual and psychological effects on survivors

Speakers & Moderator Bios



Prof. Dr. Marleen Temmerman

Is a well-recognized global leader in women, child & adolescent health. She brings academic, research, technical, political, governance, management and leadership skills to the table as well as diplomacy, advocacy, fundraising, training and clinical expertise. She has a strong track record of working with governments, multilateral organisations, academia, professional bodies, development agencies, private sector, consultancy agencies, civil society, non-governmental and faith based organisations, in a global and changing world. Currently, she is Chair of the Department of Obstetrics and Gynaecology, Aga Khan University Hospital and Director of the Center of Excellence in Women and Child Health, Aga Khan University, Nairobi, Kenya. Her interest is women's health and rights, sexual and reproductive health, including cervical cancer prevention and treatment. She is the Founding Director of the International Centre of Reproductive Health (ICRH) at Ghent University, Belgium with sister research organizations in Kenya and Mozambique, and a large global collaborative academic network of 27 Universities globally.



Dr. Venkatraman Chandra-Mouli

Leads the work on Adolescent Sexual and Reproductive Health (ASRH) in the World Health Organization's Department of Reproductive Health and Research (which includes the UNDP/UNFPA/UNICEF/WHO/World Bank Human Reproductive Programme). His work includes building the evidence base on ASRH, and supporting countries to translate this evidence into action through well-conceived and well-managed policies and programmes. His experience in generating knowledge and taking knowledge to action is global in scope and spans over 30 years. Dr Chandra-Mouli

joined WHO in early-1993 and worked on HIV/AIDS prevention till mid-1996. Since then, his work has focussed on adolescent health. Before joining WHO, he worked in Zambia, India and Zimbabwe for 12 years – providing primary care services (with a private Zambian company), preventing childhood malnutrition (with a Zambian NGO - Kitwe Nutrition Group), preventing HIV and responding to people with HIV (with another Zambian NGO -Copperbelt Health Education Project), setting up a regional training and mentoring initiative – 'School Without Walls' (with the Canadian Public Health Association); and funding HIV/AIDS related work - 'NGO AIDS Cell' (with the Norwegian Agency for Development Cooperation). Drawing upon these experiences, he has presented in scores of global, regional and national conferences, and authored/ co-authored books, book chapters, newsletter articles, blog pieces and over 90 peer-reviewed journal articles.



Hon. Dr. Anisa Ahmed Omar

Is a specialist pediatrician and experienced hospital administrator. She is currently working with Kilifi County Government as a County Executive Committee member for health since 4th January 2018. She worked with Pathfinder International as the Deputy Chief of Parties, As the Medical Superintendent of Malindi District Hospital and the District Medical Officer of Health for Malindi District for 8 years, Dr Anisa provided managerial leadership at the district hospital and was responsible for mobilization of funds to effect the expansion of the hospital from an 80 bed to 200 bed capacity with resultant dramatic increase of revenue from 300,000 to 2.5 million Kenyan shillings per month. Hospital infrastructure was considerably expanded under her leadership. In 2000 she was awarded a Head of State Commendation for exemplary work and in 2010 she was awarded the Order of the Grand Warrior for her contribution to health care for the people of Kenya.



Faith Fao Opiyo

Is an advocate of Sexual Reproductive Health and Rights. She is the founder of Centre for Young Women Empowerment (CYWE) a registered community based organization in Kenya Soweto slums that deals with empowerment of youths and adolescent girls with inclusion of boys on matters of Sexual Reproductive Health, Gender and Leadership and governance. She is currently the chairperson of Youth Advisory Panel to UNFPA, representing the 15 counties that UNFPA is supporting, she also sits on the board of Youth Steering Committee of UN Women East and southern Africa furthermore she is a trainer of Trainers in Kenya on Sexual reproductive Health by Ministry of Health.



Prof. Peter Gichangi

Is the Deputy Vice Chancellor Academic Affairs, Research and Extension (ARE) and Research Professor at the Technical University of Mombasa. He is also a visiting professor of obstetrics and gynecology at Ghent University Belgium. Peter received his Doctorate from Nairobi University. His research interests lie in the areas of sexual and reproductive health, maternal and child health, HIV/ AIDS, Family Planning, HIV care and support, as well as gynecological oncology issues. Peter has over 90 publications in a variety of medical and scientific journals. He is the Principal Investigator for the Performance Monitoring for Action project in Kenya.



Dr. Michaela Mantel

Is a Senior Advisor and Senior Health Programme Officer at the Aga Khan University, Nairobi. Her areas of expertise include health system strengthening from community to primary health care and referral levels; maternal, newborn, child, and adolescent health; sexual, reproductive health and health rights; quality assurance in health care; public-private partnerships; capacity building and context relevant research. Dr Mantel

supports AKDN in strategic and institutional development and engages with partners in the region and beyond. Her focus of work is currently on supporting the Centre of Excellence in Women and Child Health and the Department of Population Health Science at the AKU in designing, developing, supervising, monitoring and evaluating implementation and research projects in the East Africa Region and beyond.



Rev. Fr. Dr. Pascal Mwambi Mwakio

Is a holder of Masters and Doctorate degree in Bioethics at Regina Apostolurum Pontifical University Rome graduating in 2014. He is currently the parish priest of St. Patrick's Catholic Parish Kilifi and the director of St Patrick's Academy Kilifi. He is also the Dean of Kilifi deanery, member of the Kilifi County Education board, and chair of St Michael's Girls' School board. He is an author of a published book (2014) entitled "The Right to Life and African concepts about life: A bioethical approach for Kenya."



Dickson Okong'o

Is a zealous youth advocate on access to justice and sexual reproductive health rights from Mombasa County. He has over eight years' working experience on youth issues, specifically adolescent sexual reproductive health rights, democracy and good governance. He is the co-founder and the current executive director of Stretchers Youth Organization – a community-based organization. The organization champions for United Nations Sustainable Development Goal 3 and 16. Dickson is part of number of networks both at county, national and international level including the Mombasa County Adolescent Technical Working Group.



Nelly Munyasia

Is the Executive Director for the Reproductive Health Network in Kenya, a network of trained health care providers, who are passionate about ensuring provision of quality comprehensive reproductive health information and services especially safe and legal abortion. She is a trained midwife/nurse and a health systems management expert, a sexual and reproductive health provider champion and an activist for girls and women rights.



Kenneth Miriti

Is a holder of BSc nursing, a higher national diploma in medical education and a basic diploma in community health nursing, and certificate in health systems management. Kenneth has strong background in reproductive health Issues with bias on AYSRHR and GBV response. He was key in the development of the adolescents and young people sexual reproductive health and rights, 2019-2022 HIV response for Kilifi. He represents the department of health in the teenage pregnancy taskforce and is the AYSRH coordinator for Kilifi County.



Dr. Mukaindo Abraham Mwaniki

Is a consultant ObsGyn and the Vice Chair of the Department of Obstetrics and Gynaecology at Aga Khan University Hospital, Nairobi. He is active in training, clinical practice and research. Over the last five years, Dr Mukaindo has extended beyond the clinical practice into the interactions between quality of health services and maternal and child health. He is currently leading a research grant examining the value of clinical mentorship for midwives in improving quality of delivery care in rural Coastal and Western Kenya. He has worked in both the private and public sectors. He holds a Bachelors of Medicine and Surgery degree and a Masters of Medicine in Obstetrics and Gynaecology. He is the former vice-chair of the Kenya Obstetrical and Gynaecological Society (KOGS).



Dr. Abdu Mohiddin

Is a public health physician-scientist with interests in public health and health systems, in particular in maternal, child and adolescent health. Most of his work is with the Aga Khan University's Centre of Excellence for Women and Child Health, with additional duties in the Department of Population Health contributing to the development of a Population Health Master's degree. He has over twenty years' experience with multi-sectoral strategies to address needs and improve health. He has worked with a wide range of stakeholders in the UK and Kenya including local and national health authorities, healthcare and related services, academia, the voluntary sector and communities.



Dr. Evaline Lang'at

Is a member of the county health management team. She holds a Master of Public Health from Flinders University, a Global Health alumnus from the University of Washington. at the Tanzania Ministry of Health (2016-2018). Previously, he was the Executive Director of Muhimbili National Hospital (2014-2015). Before that, he was head of the hospital's teaching, research and consultancy unit (2013-2015), and consultant in-charge at the eclampsia ward (2007-2013) He has in-depth experience with development of multiple clinical guidelines for Tanzania Ministry of Health. He is associate editor for BMC pregnancy and childbirth, and member of Institutional Review Boards at AMREF, Tanzania office, and Ifakara medical research institute.



Saida W Mwinyi

Is a Clinical Nurse Counselor working at the ICRHK/CPGH GBVRC (international Centre for reproductive health in partnership with Coast General Hospital Gender based violence recovery centre).
