

Welcome to the third edition of the PLSP Quarterly Newsletter. 2021 was an eventful year for PLSP!

The secretariat pulling the strings behind the nationwide movement continued to power through, right in the middle of a pandemic and managed to prepare a workforce of 20,000 Life Savers – all of them eager to save lives through CPR and Bleeding Control.



In November 2021, **PLSP Leadership called on Governor Imran Ismail** and discussed the need for country-wide CPR and Bleeding Control Training. The Governor Sindh appreciated the spirit and efforts of the team and assured them of full support for the programme.

the Aga Khan University.












Overview of Trainings








Pakistan Rangers Trainings

Exclusive interview with Mr. Riaz Ahmed Kamlani

Driven by his unwavering passion for education, Mr. Riaz Ahmed Kamlani has not only led TCF to new zeniths of success but has also always lent great advice for Pakistan Life Savers Programme.

The PLSP Secretariat was fortunate to connect with Mr. Kamlani and talk about his perspective on teaching lifesaving skills to the youth of Pakistan.

<u>Question: How would you define your vision for education in Pakistan?</u>

Every Pakistani should have a vision for education if they have a vision for Pakistan.

Currently, 50 million Pakistani children are supposed to be in schools, out of which only 28 million are studying. To make it worse, Pakistan ranks number 2 in terms of the number of 'out of school' children – this is nothing to be proud of.

We need to work for our children – on an individual, family, and community level. At the expense of sounding proudly idealistic, if we can do what we can within our sphere of influence, we can achieve a noticeable difference. It will not be revolutionary, and it will be evolutionary – and we ought to be comfortable with it.

Question: What do you think is the need or relevance of teaching lifesaving skills to school/college children?

When I was first introduced to PLSP, two things appealed to me: the people behind the initiative and simple, clear focus. I could count on the fact that the team had good intentions and were actually trying to make a substantial difference.

By design, CPR is a skill that does not benefit any person performing it. No one performs CPR on themselves – we all learn to perform it on someone else. This notion is what makes us all more human. Anything as selfless as this is always relevant for the youth.

<u>Question: What kind of an impact would you want</u> <u>PLSP to have in the long run?</u>

Quite honestly, I am not too worried about the impact. The impact of well-intentioned and well-focused work always exceeds the impact we plan to achieve.

I have closely observed the great stories of Edhi Foundation and Indus Hospital, and it's safe to say that good intention spread the ripples of impact far more than what was envisioned. I hope that PLSP is on its way to achieving a similar standing.

Question: How do you see the possibilities of growth for PLSP?

The end in my mind is that PLSP as an identity, becomes self-sustained, outlives this ten-year movement, and is owned by the society.

We should aspire to reach a point where every parent considers CPR and Bleeding Control a fundamental skill that their child ought to know – just like they ought to learn math and science.

Our second manifestation of success would be more and more people taking on an active bystander role at Shahrae Faisal after an accident, rather than slowing down their cars, pitying the victims, and driving on.

Question: Since we are imparting lifesaving skills to the youth and are non-medicalizing CPR and Bleeding Control, how do you see this partnership between academia and healthcare?

Meaningful collaborations – and anything that goes beyond public reports and fancy conferences – always help each other.

If there is a meaningful partnership, every youth in Pakistan would want to step forward for something that is not for their own benefit.

Eventually, there might come the point where the youth might think, "Okay, I have learned CPR and Bleeding Control; what else can I master?" - that is the kind of meaningful collaboration we need to focus on.
