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Foundations for Learning (F4L) Project in Action Partnerships

Dean's visit to Muni University, Uganda

The Dean of the Aga Khan University, Institute for Educational Development, East Africa (AKU-IED, EA) recently visited MUNI University in Uganda to oversee the implementation of the Diploma in Educational Leadership and Management (DELM) programme.

DELM is a programme delivered collaboratively between IED, EA, and MUNI University and was launched in May 2023 onboarding 35 course participants comprising headteachers and deputy headteachers from Yumbe and Arua districts in the West Nile Region.

"We acknowledge the partnership between us and IED, EA which has led to the development

of the DELM programme and participation in various events that foster knowledge sharing and create more opportunities for us," emphasised, Prof. Fr. Rev. Epiphany Picho, DVC Finance and Administration-MUNI University.

The programme has supported Course Participants (CPs) in procuring teaching and learning materials, improved computer literacy, and maintained online sessions to keep participants and coordinators engaged in programme-related activities.

Research Advisory Committee Meeting (RAC) in Kenya

The Research team from IED, EA engaged in a face-to-face interaction with the committee members. The primary goal of the meeting was to establish a strong working relationship and foster trust within the team and also provide the RAC members with comprehensive updates and present the findings of cycle one of the F4L longitudinal study conducted in Kenya.

The meeting served as a platform to highlight the progress made, identify challenges faced, and explore opportunities encountered during the implementation of the longitudinal study in Kenya. The collaborative discussions aimed at charting a way forward and ensuring a shared understanding and commitment among all stakeholders.

Mentorship, Support, and Reflection for Tutors in Lindi, Tanzania.

A mentorship and reflection session was conducted to examine the opportunities available for tutors and the challenges that they face in the implementation of mentoring and reflection in their practices. The support visit also purposed to identify other challenges in their practices such as lesson preparation, classroom instruction development, use of teaching and learning resources, and seek collaborative solutions with the tutors. During the visit, the tutors showcased

their commitment by arriving armed with prepared lesson plans, notes, and schemes of work. The expected outcomes of the exercise were to empower the tutors in their personal development and enhance the tutors' professional practices concerning the areas introduced in the F4L project. These include the application of active learning methodologies, the use of teaching and learning resources, ICT integration in teaching and learning, mainstreaming gender, and inclusion in their practices.


