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KHYBER MEDICAL UNIVERSITY SYMPOSIUM

Khyber Medical University organized its 5th Annual Health Research Conference in Peshawar, Pakistan in collaboration with the Department of Emergency Medicine (DEM), Aga Khan University and JHU-Pakistan ICTIRT from February 14 - 16, 2014. The theme of this three-day conference was "Today's Research Tomorrow's Health".

Professor Dr. Muhammad Hafizullah (KMU Vice Chancellor) and Professor Dr. Mukhtiar Zaman-(Director Office of Research Innovation & Commercialization) highlighted the importance of research in the advancement of the health care sector. The Minister of Health, Khyber Pakhtunkhwa Mr. Shaukat Ali Yousafzai also attended the conference and shared the importance of research and technological advancement in the region.

Dr. Junaid A. Razzak, was invited to share his exper-

iences of research priorities for Emergency Medicine in Pakistan. He also shared his insights and expertise on careers in Emergency Medicine. DEM faculty including our alumni, Drs. Nadeem Ullah Khan and Uzma Rahim Khan participated both in the symposium and workshops and gave talks on various aspects of emergency medicine and injury research. There were 18 poster presentations and five oral presentations.

Two workshops were also conducted; "Blended Learning: Opportunities for Medical Education & Research" by Dr. Jabeen Fayyaz, Assistant Professor, Section of Pediatric Emergency Medicine, DEM, AKU and "Healthcare Economics for Medical Professionals" by Mr. Ashar Malik, Senior Instructor, Department of Community Health Sciences, AKU.

WORKSHOP ON DISASTER PREPAREDNESS

Aman Healthcare Services in collaboration with the Department of Emergency Medicine at AKU, Harvard Humanitarian Initiative and JHU-Pakistan ICTIRT organized a two-day workshop titled "Preparing Emergency Department for Disasters" on January 24 and 25, 2014 at AKU.

The main idea behind this workshop was to deliver comprehensive knowledge of the correct methods to manage various disaster situations that arise in an Emergency Department as well as to discuss efficient disaster management strategies and their implementation.

The workshop included presentations followed by break-out brainstorming and discussion sessions. Interactive sessions included real disaster situations in hospital premises that used a combination of structured dialogs and scenario analysis.

Thirty participants from major healthcare facilities and emergency services in Karachi including AKU, Civil Hospital, Jinnah Post Graduate Medical Center, Abbasi Shaheed Hospital, Patel Hospital, Indus Hospital, The Aman Foundation and First Response Initiative of Pakistan attended the workshop. The participants were emergency medicine physicians, managers,

residents, safety and security managers, and researchers with a keen interest in area of emergency medicine and disaster preparedness.

Drs. Kayden Stephanie, Shawn D' Andrea, Usha Periyanayagam and Payal Modi from Harvard Humanitarian Initiative facilitated the workshop.

WORKSHOP ON BURDEN OF VIOLENCE

The Department of Emergency Medicine (DEM) at AKU, and JHU-Pakistan ICTIRT in collaboration with AKU Department of Psychiatry as well as the AKU School of Nursing and Midwifery (SONAM), conducted a one-day workshop on violence prevention among children, adults and at workplace settings. This workshop titled "Towards Reducing the Burden of Violence: A Biopsychosocial Approach to the Screening and Management of Non-Accidental Trauma" was conducted on January 29, 2014 with lead organization by our alumnus, Dr. Uzma Rahim Khan.

This workshop was focused on teaching clinical staff, mainly residents and nurses, the hand-on skills required for the identification, treatment and overall management of victims of abuse and violence. The main objectives of the workshop were to identify global and national burden of violence against women and child abuse; describe the extent of workplace violence in Emergency Departments of Karachi; identify the risk factors associated with violence against women, child abuse and workplace violence. The workshop also trained the attendees to conduct screening for VAW, child abuse and to devise a management plan in line with a biopsychosocial model.

Drs. Asad Mian, Waleed Zafar from DEM, Dr. Ayesha Mian from Department of Psychiatry, Drs. Rozina Karmaliani and Tazeen Saeed Ali were the workshop facilitators.

The workshop was attended by 38 participants including physicians, residents, nurses from departments of Emergency Medicine, Pediatrics and Psychiatry and social workers and child advocacy organizations. The participants appreciated the importance of the topic and enjoyed the discussion session with the workshop facilitators.

According to Naveed "an effective rehabilitation program for traumatic brain injury and post spinal cord injury patients can prevent further trauma and ultimately minimizes

the financial burden on healthcare facility".

He has been involved in the care of elderly patients through Home Physiotherapy Services and has worked to minimized risk of falls in elderly in home environment by prescribing walking frames and teaching muscle strengthening exercises.

Naveed believes that disability and rehabilitation are an important public health issues and affect large population in Pakistan. He hopes that JHU-Pakistan ICTIRT program will provide him the platform to focus on these issues by devising and instigating effective policies.
