A message from the Program

Dear Colleagues,

Welcome to another exciting issue of the Johns Hopkins-Pakistan Fogarty International Trauma and Injury Research Training Program (JHU-Pakistan ICTIRT). Our program has been busy with a spectrum of training, research and capacity development activities. We are delighted to be working as a triumvirate of institutions – Johns Hopkins Bloomberg School of Public Health (JHSPH), Aga Khan University (AKU) and Khyber Medical University (KMU) - expanding our reach and work in Pakistan.

This newsletter reports on a major event for our grant – the 3rd Annual Emergency Medicine Conference – the annual national meeting of emergency medicine, trauma, injury and clinical professionals from around Pakistan and the region. This meeting was held on March 16, 2013 in Karachi, Pakistan and focused on pediatric emergency medicine – initiating a new dialogue within the country. The conference involved new developments, emerging research, and key policy initiatives in areas such as emergency care, disaster management systems, trauma care, public health approach to injury pre-

vention and child health. Nearly 400 colleagues and participants from the public, private and nongovernmental health sectors from around Pakistan attended; and eight members of our program were able to attend. Special workshops were held on poisoning in children, child abuse and pediatric injuries. Our trainees and alumni played a prominent role at the national meeting, contributing upto 30 posters, and 9 oral presentations. Moreover, our alumna – Nadeem Ullah Khan – chaired the organizing committee!

The core objective of our program is to build a strong network of professionals and help develop sustainable research capacity on acute care of trauma and injuries and emergency medicine in Pakistan. We are delighted to have three new trainees join the first year of AKUs masters program in Epidemiology and Biostatistics; while our trainee from last year is planning to complete the program soon. Great start to 2013!

ANNUAL EMERGENCY MEDICINE CONFERENCE, MARCH 2013

The Department of Emergency Medicine (DEM) at (AKU), in collaboration with the Fogarty JHU-PAK ICTIRT program, organized the third Annual Emergency Medicine Conference, AEMC 2013, held on March 16, 2013. The theme of AEMC 2013 was Emergency Care for Children. In collaboration with different national and international experts, eight pre- and postconference workshops were also conducted. The workshop was attended by national participants from institutions and hospitals all over Pakistan.

The conference provided an opportunity for emergency physicians, public health professionals, policy makers and students to discuss the latest advances in Pediatric Emergency Medicine (PEM) and highlighted the health system challenges and research and training needs for PEM in Pakistan. The conference also helped in building national and international collaborations to enhance the development of Pediatric Emergency Medicine as a distinct specialty in Pakistan.

Around 400 participants from all over Pakistan attended the conference and learnt from pediatric emergency care experts from Pakistan as well as United States, Canada, Oman, and Kingdom of Saudi Arabia.

A total of 30 posters were presented at the conference with 9

oral presentations. The selected abstracts were published in a special supplement of Journal of Pakistan Medical Association. Dr. Nadeem Ullah Khan chaired the organizing committee. AEMC 2013 was live telecasted to three sites in Afghanistan: the French Medical Institute of Children (FMIC) in Kabul, Faizabad, and Bamiyan. It was also broadcast in Kenya (Nairobi), and Tanzania (Darussalam).

SHORT COURSE ON PREVENTION OF CHILD INJURY, MARCH 2013

A two-day short course on Prevention of Child Injury was conducted on March 17 - 18, 2013. The course was based on the World Health Organization (WHO) Violence and Injury Prevention course on injury prevention. The purpose of this course was to describe the prevention of child injury from a global perspective. It provides an overview of injury as a public health problem, the burden of child injury and the challenges and opportunities to implement strategies to prevent child injury.

A total of 25 participants from Karachi, Islamabad, Peshawar, Lahore, Umerkot and Sukkur attended the course. This course was accredited 12 CME hours by the Department of Continuing Professional Education (DCPE) of the AKU. The DCPE is accredited by the American Academy of Continuing Medical Education (AACME) to provide continuing medical education for physicians and takes responsibility for the content, quality and scientific integrity of this CME activity.

The course was divided into different topics including introduction to child injury, burden of child injury, injury prevention methodology and approaches, injury scoring, summary measures, burns, fall, road traffic injuries and drowning. Participants were provided the reading material for the entire course. The course involved interactive discussion session and individual and group activities.

Dr. Uzma Rahim Khan of JHU - Pakistan ICTIRT organized the course while other speakers included Drs. Amber Mehmood, Junaid Razzak, Adnan Hyder and Dr. Siran He.




INTRODUCING NEW FELLOW - HASANA QADRI

During her graduate studies, Dr. Qadri participated in many research activities related to clinical trials, adverse drug reactions, patient safety and oral coagulants. She was also involved in pre-clinical animal-based research in pharmacology.

While a student, she took different courses on creating various disease models in animals related to depression, epilepsy, inflammation and pain along with the study designs particularly related to clinical trials. Such courses have provided her with a strong footing in the theoretical concepts of clinical research. Later in 2010, she started her professional career at Department of Pharmacy, AKU as a pharmacist. Her experience at the Drug and Poison Information Center got her interested in poisoning prevention.

Under Fogarty Johns Hopkins University – Pakistan International Collaborative Trauma and Injury Research Training Program, she would like to pursue the area of injury prevention particularly developing poison control center and measuring impact on decreasing morbidity and mortality associated with poisoning. Research has always been of interest to her.

INTRODUCING NEW FELLOW - KHAULA KHATLANI

Khaula Khatlani is a graduate of Dow Medical College, Karachi. She received her General Surgery training in the United States and also worked as a research fellow at University of Pennsylvania and Wayne State University, USA and Duke-NUS Medical College in Singapore. Her surgical training and research work provided her with a unique appreciation of the importance of preventive care for the severely injured and critically ill patients.

She is specifically interested in prevention of trauma in pregnant women. As part of her masters in Epidemiology and Biostatistics at AKU, she plans to look at the association between intimate partner violence during pregnancy and stillbirths. Intimate partner violence is a serious public health issue which effects a large number of women worldwide. Pregnant women who are abused are at risk of having poor birth outcomes such as preterm births, low birth weight and miscarriages. However, studies exploring the relationship of violence with stillbirths are limited.

The Fogarty Johns Hopkins University – Pakistan International Collaborative Trauma and Injury Research Training Program will provide her the platform to conduct this study as part of her Masters thesis. She wishes to pursue a career as a clinician scientist.

Through Fogarty Johns Hopkins University – Pakistan International Collaborative Trauma and Injury Research Training Program she intends to explore various dimensions of trauma and injury in the context of developing country like Pakistan. Her specific interest is to evaluate the mental health aspect of trauma survivors and of their caregiver. She will look at the burden of posttraumatic stress disorder in trauma care providers in Karachi and its impact on their work performance. The goal is to identify high risk people and direct resources towards providing psychological support to them.
