With campuses in Kenya, Tanzania and Uganda, we offer programmes that are designed to give you the knowledge and skills needed for a career in nursing and midwifery. Our focus is on producing nurses and midwives who possess the clinical skills, problem-solving abilities and leadership capacities needed to become outstanding professionals.



Nursing and midwifery at AKU

Our vision is to provide you with an internationally benchmarked quality education that is relevant, innovative, affordable and needs-based.

We enable graduates to develop the skills, knowledge and experience of the modern nurse and midwife, helping them to grow by encouraging participation in evidencebased practice and by facilitating connections with networks outside the East African region

As a research-active school, our faculty are qualified expert nurses and midwives, who are able to impart knowledge and skills that allow graduates to be innovative and creative in finding solutions to local and global health problems. We use a dynamic learning model and an innovative curriculum in a work-study programme that makes it possible for nurses and midwives to continue working while studying.

Our standards are recognized worldwide and our students have the opportunity to draw from a wealthy pool of knowledge of experts, from within Africa and elsewhere.

Awards

Our School and our students have received awards and scholarships within East Africa and from abroad.

In 2017, a member of our faculty in Tanzania was awarded the Midwife for Life Award by the International Confederation of Midwives in Toronto, Canada. In the same year, a member of our Uganda faculty received a rare Commonwealth Scholarship to complete her PhD studies in nursing from the University of Salford in the United Kingdom.

Our programme

Our nursing degree blends solid academic preparation, innovative teaching methods and clinical experiences to enable you to provide holistic care for individual.

You will benefit from small classes, well-qualified and supportive faculty and an intensive curriculum that goes beyond national requirements to include coursework in subjects such as critical thinking and culture, health and society - areas of study that our graduates consistently say are especially strong influences on their careers.

What will you learn?

In the first year, you will explore the biomedical sciences such as anatomy and physiology, biochemistry, microbiology and pathophysiology, before moving on to advanced concepts in medical-surgical nursing.

You will have the opportunity to engage in critical analysis, improve your academic writing and investigate the connection between information technology and healthcare.

During the second year, the modules will give you exposure to the social determinants of health, reproductive health, child health, community health, and mental health and psychiatry. You will get an opportunity to engage in research and teaching and learning.

In the final half-year, you will focus on leadership and management skills, and on the planning and decisionmaking needed to deliver care effectively

You can also take an elective course that can improve and change practice through an evidence-based project.

How will you learn?

You will attend classes and conduct clinical rotations for two days each week, then work at your job for the remaining three days.

In addition, you will have one-on-one time with the instructors to gain clarity on any aspects that were not understood in the class and clinical settings. You will also have access to mentorship from the instructors as well as regular assessments from the faculty to ensure you make continual progress.

Your clinical practice skills will be sharpened through guided learning that takes place in hospitals, mental health hospitals, and community-based health facilities or settings approved by the Nursing Council of Kenya.

What facilities are available?

In each of its three East African campuses, the School has well-stocked and modern libraries that feature a wide range of materials and that are highly conducive to study and research. There are also well-equipped clinical skills labs that facilitate active learning in safe environments.

What are our entry requirements?

You will need to

- Be a Kenya Registered Community Health Nurse (KHRCN) or Kenya Registered Nurse or Kenya Registered Midwife (KRN/KRM).
- Have at least two years of continuous experience in a clinical care setting as a KHRCN or KRN/KRM.
- Have a KCSE Aggregate C+ (Plus) or KCE Division II with a minimum of C (Plain) grade in the mandatory subjects of English and Biology/Biological Science as well as a Pass grade in Mathematics, Chemistry, Physics or Physical Sciences

You are expected to demonstrate good communication abilities, leadership and a commitment to the nursing profession. You must also have nursing knowledge and skills appropriate for study at the baccalaureate level. These qualities will be evaluated through the admission test, letters of reference and a personal oral interview.

When do classes begin?

You have the option of starting the two-and-a-half-year programme either in February or August.

How do you apply?

You must fill out an application form and sign it, and submit it along with certified copies of your:

- KCSE or KCE certificate
- Diploma in Nursing certificate
- Diploma in Nursing transcript
- Certificate of enrolment/registration with Nursing Council of Kenya
- Letter of release/recommendation from current
- Two passport-size photographs
